### Guymon rodeo a family affair for the Muncy clan

GUYMON, Okla. – Folks in the Oklahoma Panhandle always call the Pioneer Days celebration a great chance for a family reunion.

Such was the case for the Muncy clan of Corona, N.M., on Saturday afternoon during the second performance of the Guymon Pioneer Days Rodeo at Henry C. Hitch Pioneer Arena. Taos and Jordan Muncy, siblings who grew up in northwestern New Mexico, were a big part of the show, as was Jordan's husband, Cody Taton.

"It's pretty nice since we all have gone to school around here," Jordan said, referring to Oklahoma Panhandle State University, a mere 10-minute drive from the arena. "Cody travels with my brother, so this week's been pretty nice in that we were all here at the same time."

While it works well for Cody and Taos, since they travel the rodeo trail together, it's not always convenient for Jordan to be along for the ride since barrel racing is often on a much different schedule than saddle bronc riding.

"It's pretty handy, because when Jordan gets done with school, her and Cody are going to move back to Corona," said Taos, the 2007 world champion who also won the college title that year. "It's always good coming back to Guymon, because it's really like a hometown rodeo for all of us."

Taos rode the Carr Pro Rodeo horse Big Time and was matched by his brother-in-law – and Curtis Garton – with a 77. Taton rode Carr's Blue Smoke. That score won't stand up to place in the money, but it was a great opportunity for all the cowboys to compete at Oklahoma's Richest Rodeo.

"It's fun that we get to come do this, because we work hard to get to where we're at," Taos said. "It's fun for me and Jordan, because growing up we traveled to all those youth rodeos together. Now we get set up differently, so we don't get up in the same performances very often."

Jordan fared a little better, posting a 17.70-second run around the cloverleaf pattern. She is just out of the money in the second go-round, but she sits 10<sup>th</sup> in the two-run aggregate with 35.71.

"What I like about this is that we get to be around all week and can run up every night and just watch the performances," said Jordan, the two-time and reigning all-around champion in the Central Plains Region of the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association.
